

Our staff of 927 employees across 12 counties delivered direct services to nearly **25,000 people** in 2022.

We provide housing, employment, and coordination of care to help people of all ages and all walks of life who are facing the challenges of addiction, aging, mental illness, HIV, poverty, traumatic brain injury, intellectual and developmental disabilities, and immigration.

Some Program Highlights

Enabling Independence for Seniors

More than 1,100 older adults received services from our Expanded In-Home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP) and Support to Aging Residents (STAR).

Language Services

- 6,000 hours of interpreting provided.
- · We offer interpreting and translation services in 15 languages, including Amharic, Arabic, Cambodian, French, Russian, Somali, Spanish, and Ukrainian.

Behavioral Health

- 2,400 clients served by the Outpatient Clinic.
- 397 clients served by our Integrated Care Program, which allows clients to receive outpatient mental health and substance use treatment from one provider at the same location.
- 175 clients served by HCBS and CORE programs.
- Over 300 adults served in our intensive residential homes which focus on stabilization and rehabilitation services.
- Over 246 adults served in our community residence programs, which support reintegration with family and community.

Community Resource Services

Since 2020, we have provided over \$10M to households that had fallen behind on rental payments, including \$1.77M in 2022.

Housing

- 1,836 served in shelters and supportive housing programs.
- Our Medical Respite program served 100 individuals who are homeless and in need of non-hospital acute care. 70% moved to more permanent housing.
- 100% STEHP* households graduated to permanent housing. *STEHP = Solutions to Ending Homelessness Program

Refugee Resettlement

- More than 2,600 refugees provided with direct resettlement services in 2022.
- Rochester became one of the largest hubs for Ukrainian assistance in the U.S.
- · We helped more than 400 Afghan humanitarian parolees apply for asylum.
